Still in Afghanistan?

Im Oktober konnte unser Mitarbeiter Johannes Nielen zusammen mit Dieter Drexler (Vorstand) unser Team in Kabul und Faizabad besuchen; sowie unsere Projektarbeit in Herat. Für Johannes war es die erste Reise nach Afghanistan. Er berichtet:

As I'm writing these lines, I'm not sure whether I've fully returned from Afghanistan. So many new impressions, things that are buzzing in the back of my mind and want to be processed. I spent a total of 16 days in the country with Dieter Drexler. It was my first time in Afghanistan, so I was very excited beforehand.

In Kabul

we had the opportunity to visit our Deaf Center and our elementary school. We were accompanied by a Taliban to a Kuchi tribe on the outside of the city.

The Lania Now School

160 students from grades 1 to 5 currently attend the school. As soon as we enter the grounds, the first ones run towards us. Many are orphans or live with relatives. Twice a week, we also provide them with a hot meal. Everyone waits in a disciplined manner until everyone in the class has something on their plate.

The deaf center

42 children are currently being taught sign language. Many of the children have reported problems at home as their parents are unable or unwilling to communicate with their children in sign language, and some are even forbidden to do so. Deaf-mutes are not accepted by society and therefore often grow up completely isolated. Many see the school as their second home, as they feel understood here. There are currently 15 schools for the deaf in Afghanistan.

Many young men stay at the center even after leaving school because they can't find work. Although they are motivated to do something, they don't have the opportunities to do so. We would like to offer various vocational training courses for them, but we currently have a much bigger concern: We had to (hopefully) temporarily close the center at the end of October because a major donor for it dropped out. We urgently need support here too.

What moves us!

The Kuchis

A few years ago, we were able to help this ethnic group regain their own livestock through a sheep project and now the annual vaccinations were due. Most Kuchis live in simple tents, which get very cold in winter.



In Faizabad

we visited an orphanage that we support and the Baghlan province, where we are supporting a number of villages after a severe flood in April 2024. Often little help reaches rural regions in particular. The Baghlan region is a good example of this. After this severe flood in spring, many houses there are still destroyed and people have no permanent homes. The region is difficult to access from the outside. We had to drive a total of 4 hours over bumpy "roads", on which you pray inside every time you see oncoming traffic and where it was still going up and down in front of my inner eye in the evening. We will continue to provide support here.

Starving people in Afghanistan

According to the World Food Program (WFP), 1 in 4 Afghans do not know where their next meal will come from.

In September 2024, the WFP was unable to support 11.4 million vulnerable people, as those in even greater need were being fed.

»One thing I can say for sure: I have never experienced anything like this. The lifestyle, the poverty, the hospitality. So many tensions, so many clashes.«

Women are not allowed to participate in public life. When we were in a village, we only saw them in their burkas from a distance. You constantly see people begging on the streets. The difference between urban and rural areas is particularly striking. Many people therefore settle on the outskirts of the cities in the hope of finding more work and better living conditions.

We will continue!

We were able to visit both dental clinics in Herat. We need permission from the government once a year to continue these projects. This has not yet been granted. For this reason, no treatment has been carried out in either dental clinic since September 26. We were able to present our problems to the Deputy Prime Minister and hope that things can continue soon. The waiting list of patients is long!

We also have to be patient when applying for other projects.
